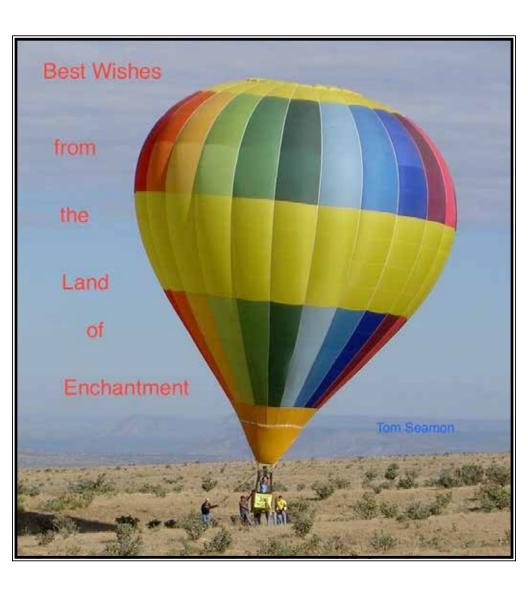

## Arlist Biographies

Pro Arte Chorale, an all-volunteer chorus now celebrating its 60th season, is one of the Northeast's most prominent choral organizations! The Chorale has appeared in major concert venues across the region including the New Jersey Performing Arts Center, Avery Fisher Hall, Alice Tully Hall, Carnegie Hall, and the South Orange Performing Arts Center. In addition to its own subscription series, the Chorale has appeared with the New Jersey Symphony Orchestra, New York Philharmonic, American Symphony Orchestra, Westfield Symphony Orchestra, and the Mark Morris Dance Company. In May 2008 the Pro Arte Chorale traveled to Liverpool, UK to perform with the Liverpool Welsh Choral at Mossley Hill Church, as part of Liverpool's celebration as Cultural Capital of Europe. In May 2009 the Liverpool Welsh Choral traveled to the U.S. to join the Pro Arte Chorale and Westfield Symphony Orchestra in performances of Verdi's Requiem in Ridgewood and Westfield, NJ. The Chorale has been conducted by William Memmott, John Nelson, Roger Nierenberg, Bart Folse, David Crone, Joshua Greene and Steven Fox. In addition, the Chorale has sung under the batons of Nicholas Mc-Gegan, Zubin Mehta, Julius Rudel, Hugh Wolff, Zdenek Macal, Yuri Temirkanov, Leon Botstein, Gerard Schwartz, David Wroe, and is now currently conducted by Bryan Zaros.



**Bryan Zaros** is a young American conductor recognized for his "strong musical imagination" and "deep sense of musicality and communication." Bryan is the Associate Director of Music & Choirmaster at the Cathedral of St. John the Divine in New York City

where he leads the Cathedral Choirs, Orchestra and Brass in liturgical as well as concert performances in the grand space of the world's largest Gothic cathedral. He is also the Music Director of the Pro Arte Chorale, Music Director of Central City Chorus and a frequent guest lecturer at the Manhattan School of Music and at music conferences throughout the USA. Currently he serves on the Board of Directors of the New York Choral Consor-

tium, on the Advisory Board to Music Sacra New York and is a conductor for the American Federation Pueri Cantores.

Recent conducting engagements have included invitations with choirs and orchestras throughout the USA, Europe and South America. Most notably he has conducted ensembles at David Geffen Hall, Alice Tully Hall, the National Cathedral in Washington D.C., at American Choral Director's Association Conferences, on the film set at Warner Bros. Studios and at various cathedrals in England including Westminster Abbey, St. Paul's Cathedral-London, Liverpool and Canterbury Cathedral.

A native New Yorker, Bryan began his professional musical training as a member of the Metropolitan Opera Children's Chorus and as a boy chorister at The Church of the Transfiguration, NYC. He holds a Bachelor of Music degree from Westminster Choir College, a Master of Music degree in Conducting from the University of Michigan and a Doctor of Musical Arts degree in Conducting from the Manhattan School of Music. **Kyunghun Kim** is enjoying his 5th season as the Artistic Director of the Ridgewood Symphony Orchestra. He frequently appears as a guest conductor with major South Korean orchestras, such as the Bucheon Philharmonic Orchestra, the SungNam Philharmonic Orchestra, and the Korean Chamber Orchestra. Mr. Kim recently made his debut with WE Philharmonic Orchestra at the

renowned Lotte Concert Hall in Korea conducting two sold-out concerts.

Mr. Kim also serves on the music faculty Kyunghun Kimat Lehman College in New York teaching string instruments, in addition to conducting the Lehman College Chamber Orchestra. He holds the additional position of the Principal Conductor of the Adelphi Orchestra. Mr. Kim has held positions as Principal Associate Conductor of Ensemble 212, Resident Conductor of the Chelsea Symphony Orchestra, and Assistant Conductor for both The Greenwich Village Orchestra and the New York Symphonic Arts Ensemble. Additionally, he has conducted the Vidin Philharmonic Orchestra and the Seoul Philharmonic Orchestra.

Before graduating from The Juilliard School in 2011 with a Masters in Orchestral Conducting under James DePriest, Mr. Kim was an assistant conductor of AXIOM, a contemporary music ensemble at the Juilliard School, and was a conductor of the same school's Music Advancement Program (MAP) orchestra. Before this, he earned an Artist Diploma in Conducting from The Curtis Institute of Music, under the auspices of Otto-Werner Mueller. Mr. Kim has participated in numerous prestigious music festivals and masterclasses including a Kurt Masur conducting seminar, the Wiener Meisterkurse, the Cabrillo Festival of Contemporary Music, and the Pierre Monteux School studying with the most notable conductors such as Kurt Masur, Michael Tilson Thomas, Alan Gilbert, and Marin Alsop.

Born in Seoul, South Korea, Mr. Kim began studying piano and violin at age five. He continued his studies at the Boston Conservatory, where he holds a Bachelor of Music in viola performance. Mr. Kim currently lives in New Jersey with his wife and two children.



Soprano **Elisa Singer Strom** enjoys a versatile career, ranging from opera to contemporary, early, and sacred music. Solo performances include soloist and member of the American Soloists Ensemble in South Korea, soprano soloist in Rossini's *Petite Messe Solennelle* and soprano soloist in Bach's *Mass in B Minor* with Sacred Music in a Sacred Space at St. Ignatius Loyola, soprano soloist in

Mozart's Requiem with Amor Artis, soloist in Scarlatti's Stabat Mater with the choir of St. John the Divine, Yvette in Opera Company of Middlebury's production of Puccini's *La Rondine*, and soprano soloist in Handel's Messiah with the Monmouth Civic Chorus. An active collaborative artist, Ms. Singer Strom has an active career performing choral music throughout the New York area and abroad with groups such as Musica Sacra, New York Choral Artists, chorus of the New York Philharmonic, Essential Voices, Voices of Ascension, American Soloists Ensemble, choir of St. John the Divine, choir of St. Ignatius Loyola, choir at Park Avenue Synagogue, and more. Elisa earned her undergraduate degree from the University of Southern California's Thornton School of Music, and her masters from the Cleveland Institute of Music.



Mary Beth Nelson Zaros is an American mezzo-soprano praised for her "richness of tone and flexibility, along with her impeccable agility on stage," as noted by the American Handel Society. Last summer, she joined the Santa Fe Opera in *Rigoletto* and *Le Nozze di Figaro*. Ms. Zaros has performed with notable companies such as Wolf Trap Opera, The Glimmerglass Festival, Juilliard Opera,

Utah Opera, Opera Delaware, Florida Grand Opera, Opera Las Vegas, Opera Baltimore, Tri-Cities Opera, Painted Sky Opera, and Houston Grand Opera. This season, she will make her principal artist debut at The Metropolitan Opera in *El Último Sueño de Frida y Diego*. Ms. Zaros is also a proud alumna of Oklahoma City University and The Juilliard School, where she was awarded a Kovner Fellowship and named a FENDI Vanguard Scholar. Alex Guerrero is a professional opera singer, choral artist, music engraver, and composer. The New York Times has praised his "apt comic timing" in André Grétry's Zémire et Azor with American Classical Orchestra, as well as his "solid" performance in Handel's The Ways of Zion Do Mourn led by William Christie at Carnegie's Zankel Hall. Mr. Guerrero was also noted for his performance as

Labano in Antonio Bencini's Gesù Nato, also with ACO, by New York Classical Review for his "excellent, beautiful sounds all around," by Classical Music Network for his "stentorian tenor when necessary," and by Woman Around Town for his "best grasp on [Italian] diction," as well as his "sunny and suave voice... ideal... for Rossini and Bellini." He also performed as a soloist with the American Symphony at David Geffen Hall, was featured on the Tania León Grammy-nominated album, Tania León: In Motion, and performs with chamber ensembles like Yale Choral Artists and True Concord, as well as with The Metropolitan Opera Extra Chorus and the Lyric Opera of Chicago Core Supplementary Chorus. He has also appeared onscreen in the film Norman and has sung on the soundtracks of the films Gemini Man and Maestro. He earned Bachelor and Master of Music degrees from Mannes in voice with concentrations in music theory,

has served on the adjunct faculty at Borough of Manhattan Community College CUNY, and is pursuing a Doctor of Musical Arts degree at Stony Brook University. (SoundCloud.com/MusicoAlex, Facebook.com/ScoresbyAlex)



Daniel Chiu is a Baritone who hails from East Setauket, NY. He was last seen performing in Carmina Burana by Carl Orff under the direction of John Wilson at SUNY New Paltz. Daniel studied at Manhattan School of Music (MM, 2021) and SUNY New Paltz (BS, 2018). He has sung roles like Barone (La Traviata), Sciarrone (Tosca), Masetto (Don Giovanni), Schaunard (La Boheme), Bob (The Old

Maid and The Thief), Gabriel von Eisenstein (Die Fledermaus), and Aeneas (Dido & Aeneas). Daniel can be found singing in the metropolitan area, and occasionally at Regina Opera in Brooklyn.

## Program Notes

Four of the five composers of this evening's concert are well known to our audience. The fifth, Hubert Parry (1848-1918), was at one time, regarded as the first great English composer since Henry Purcell. This was an interesting situation since the audiences in the United Kingdom were the most extensive consumers of publicly performed music in Europe. For many years, foreign composers like German born Handel dominated British music. Today, Parry is primarily known as a choral composer.

**Hubert Parry** was born into an upper class family with an appreciation for the arts. However, the family had planned for a commercial career for the young boy. Hubert attended Eton, but studied piano outside of school. While still in his mid-teens, he sat for and passed the Bachelor of Music degree at Oxford University and published his first compositions. In 1867, he entered Oxford University. Graduation from Oxford lead to the day position as an insurance underwriter for Lloyd's of London. In the evenings, he composed and researched music.

He soon came to the notice of George Grove (1820-1990). Grove was engaged by Macmillan Publishing to create reference book on music. The massive undertaking was called The Dictionary of Music and Musicians. Parry contributed 123 articles to the new publication that was originally released in four volumes.

In the days before the internet, Groves (as it was commonly known) was the first source that music students consulted in doing research. Every library, including local town libraries, had their copy of Groves. The encyclopedia is still available by internet subscription through Oxford University. It currently consists of twenty volumes.

Groves became the first head of the Royal College of Music. In 1883 he hired Parry as a professor of composition and of music history. In 1895, Parry succeeded Grove as the college's head. Among Parry's students were both Vaughan Williams and Holst.

The text of I Was Glad is excerpted from Psalm 122 of the English Book of Common Prayer. It has been used for every coronation of an English monarch since Charles I in 1626. The anthem is sung when the King makes his first entrance into Westminster Abby. Different composers set the words leading up to Parry setting in 1902 for the coronation of Edward VI. It was revised in 1911 for the coronation of George V.

I Was Glad has also been used for the wedding of Charles and Diana, The wedding of William and Kate, and the Silver, Gold and Platinum Jubilees of Elizabeth II.

Some of **Wolfgang Amadeus Mozart's** (1756-1791) most respected works were composed during his final year. Troubled by debt for several preceding years. Mozart's financial situation had considerably improved. In June, he was in the city of Baden where his friend Anton Stoll was music director of St. Stephen's Church. Stoll asked Mozart to compose a work for the feast day of Corpus Christi, recognized by Catholic, Lutheran and Anglican Church as occurring on the Thursday after Trinity Sunday.

As the basis of the motet that he composed, Mozart chose the communion chant of Ave Verum Corpus that dates back to the Thirteenth Century. The work received its first performance on June 23, 1791. The motet was written for a SATB choir, string instruments and organ.

**Johannes Brahms** was reaching the top of his form in choral writing in the latter 1860s. This period saw the composition of his Alto Rhapsody, the German Requiem, the cantata Rinaldo, and Schicksalied, Op. 54.

The composer was visiting a friend, Albert Dietrich, in the city of Wilhelmshaven in the summer of 1868 when he chanced upon a copy of Hyperion or the Hermit in Greece written by poet and philosopher Friedrich Holderin (1770-1843). He was attracted to the poem Schicksalied (Song of Destiny) and immediately commenced setting it to music. After quickly completing the text, he stopped, unable to decide how the finish the work and set it aside. Brahms then commenced composing his Alto Rhapsody, Op. 53, and oversaw its premiere.

The problem facing Brahms resulted from the two part nature of Holderin's poem. The first part describes man's envy of the blissful state of the gods dwelling on Mount Olympus. The second part bemoans the reality of the real world man earthly suffering leading to a lack of hope. Brahms did not wish for the composition to conclude on such a negative tone.

Eventually a suggestion came from Hermann Levi (1839-1900). He suggested to Brahms that for the concluding third section, he could repeat the opening prelude. Brahms changed the key of the opening and rescored the music to add a sense of hope for man's future.

The premiere of *Schicksaled*, Op. 54 occurred in Karlsruhe on October 18, 1871 in a performance directed by Levi. The work is scored for a four part chorus accompanied by a standard orchestra.

Audiences often overlook the simple fact that composers often compose to make their living. To Mozart, composition was easy. Mozart's problem was that he spent more than he earned. Parry had to rely upon his day job as an insurance underwriter until he was hired by George Grove to write articles for his Dictionary of Music and Musicians. Brahms gave up his position as the conductor of the Weiner Singakademie in order to devote more time to composition.

Camille Saint-Saëns (1835-1921) held the position of organist at La Madeline, the most important church of the Second Empire from 1858-1877. With his regular duties plus additional fees for weddings and funerals, he had a comfortable living. However, he wished to spend more time composing and touring as a pianist, and he resigned his position. Fortunately for Saint-Saëns, one of his patrons, Albert Luibon, died. Libon was a postal official for the city of Paris and quite wealthy. He left Saint-Saëns 100,000 francs a considerable sum, in his will with the provision that Saint-Saëns compose a requiem mass in honor of Libon to be performed on the first anniversary of his death.

In the spring of 1878, Saint-Saëns took a hotel room in Bern Switzerland and wrote the Requiem in eight days.

The requiem is for soloists, four-part choir, organ and orchestra. Saint-Saëns conducted the premiere performance on May 22, 1878 at the cathedral Saint-Sulpice.

Because of the bequest, Saint-Saëns did not have to take a position for the rest of his life and was able to devote his time to composing and concertizing.

In the world of opera, we usually only remember the name of the composer while ignoring the person who writes the words. Broadway does not ignore the person who provides the lyrics. The teams of Rodgers and Hart, Rodgers and Hammerstein, Lerner and Lowe, Kander and Ebb, Bock and Harnick among others come to mind. **Giuseppe Verdi** (1813–1901) collaborated ten times with Francesco Maria Piave (1810–1876) in crafting operas including *La Forza del Destino*. In addition to being a librettist for numerous other composers, Piave was also a writer and translator.

Verdi had planned to not write any more opera after encountering numerous problems with censors after composing *Un Ballo in Maschera*. However, the Imperial Court Opera of St. Petersburg in 1860 offered Verdi 60,000 francs plus expenses for a new work, and he happily set to work. Piave and Verdi chose the Spanish drama *Don Alvaro o la fuera del sino* by Angel de Saaveda as the basis of the new opera, and it was ready for presentation with a year. Casting provided a problem, and the opera's premiere was delayed until November 10, 1862.

The opera was relatively successful and was soon performed in other cities. However, Verdi was not satisfied and working with Antonio Ghislazoni (1824-1893), a prolific librettist with over 80 operatic collaborations, made revisions and incorporated a scene from Friedrich Schillers' play Wallenstein. It was at this time that Verdi composed the overture that opens the opera. Previously, a short prelude preceded the opening curtain. There is a suggestion that Verdi also intended the overture to be a stand alone composition.

The revised version of *La Forza del Destino* and its overture was performed in Milan in February of 1869.
